Our Journey with God.

'Life is a journey, not a destination,' wrote Ralph Waldo Emerson, the eighteenth century American philosopher.

For some people reaching their destination is all that matters. Having a destination to aim for is a good thing in many ways. Without a clear destination a journey loses its focus. However, for others, making plans for the journey and enjoying the journey while heading for their destination are important.

We should enjoy the journey, wherever we go. Whatever we do, life is full of challenges. We may aim for many things: to leave school, to be an adult, to have a qualification or a specific job, but the journey and what we experience on it, helps us to make us the people we are. When we go through personal trials, we discover the kind of courage and faith we have. James said that God wants us to have the kind of faith that overcomes. (James1:12) 'Happy is the person who remains faithful under trials, because when he succeeds in passing such a test, he will receive as his reward the life which God has promised to those who love Him.'

Peter agrees with James. (1 Peter4: 12-13) 'My dear friends, do not be surprised at the painful test you are suffering, as though something unusual were happening to you. Rather, be glad that you are sharing Christ's sufferings, so that you may be full of joy when His glory is revealed.' Trials on our journey with God reveal our faith and develop our character.
