We consider words from the New Testament: Mt.5,1-12:

Now when Jesus saw the crowds, he went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples came to him, and he began to teach them.

'Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

'Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.'

Dear friends

What might be the reason for choosing to read this passage from the Gospel on the occasion of Remembrance Sunday, when we remember those who have laid down their lives on the battlefields of Europe and beyond for a future in freedom for our nation? Can a war such as the one they fought, and for which we remember them, be won in the way laid out in the Beatitudes? The answer, surely, is no, it cannot.

And yet the deeper truth is that war is a thing from which man will emerge victorious *only* in this way!

War is a state of enmity prevailing in the heart of man who has turned from God and has abandoned knowledge of him. It is overcome only when that state is altered.

In the so-called Beatitudes Jesus describes this altered state through the attitudes and actions which proceed from it and express it. They are Jesus's call to arms and to duty for the battle that is to be fought in order to overcome the state of enmity and restore peace to a war-minded world.

This war-mindedness of the world is overcome by those in whom a principle rules that is different from that of a war-minded world. It is overcome by those who *are poor in spirit*, who hang on every word of God in self-abandon and childlike trust; it is overcome by those who rather than focussing on happiness at any cost *mourn* the fact and consequence of sin; it is overcome by those who choose the way of *meekness* over the way of power; it is overcome by those who *hunger and thirst for righteousness* such as to put that before self-fulfilment and having one's own way; it is overcome by those who *are merciful*, who do not count up wrongs in order to get their own back but show grace, forgive and seek restoration; it is overcome by those who *are pure in heart*, who do not resort to deception nor yield to lies and to lying; it is overcome by those who *are peacemakers*, who are willing for the sake of peace to pay the price for the guilt of others; it is overcome by those who *are persecuted because of righteousness*, who stay the righteous course when all around declare it to be wrong and even take action against it.

Jesus calls those who do so 'blessed' because the outcome of what they do is rewarded with a state of things where enmity shall cease to prevail and man shall be filled with God-mindedness.

Dear friends, this call is to Jesus' disciples, to those who hear and follow him. Not because it lies within their capabilities or possibilities – it does not! But because he will lead them into this attitude and practice, will teach them and enable them, will give them the strength and wherewithal to do it. He will give to them and apply to them through the Holy Spirit the victory of his cross and resurrection whereby in his own body, accused of the sins of the world, he bore away the state of enmity (putting it to death in his own death), reconciling man to God through the forgiveness of sins.

Dear friends, when Jesus calls us to is a battle, and it is a battle which, if we remain true, will cost us our lives. When he says 'Come!' he bids us lay down our lives. The world stands against faith and godliness from which these principles arise and wars against it. We shall remain true only if we do it *because of Jesus Christ* and not because of an expectation that we will win out personally as friends of and with the world. "*Don't you know*", says James, "*that friendship with the world means enmity against God*?" (4,4)

But if we stand because of Jesus Christ, seeking his guidance and strength and relying upon grace to help us in our weakness and to overcome our sinfulness (our inclination to comply with the world's voice!), we will find our reward in him. "Very truly, I tell you", Jesus says, "unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds.

Anyone who loves their life will lose it, while anyone who hates their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me; and where I am, my servant also will be. My Father will know the one who serves me." AMEN

- 1 Who can sound the depths of sorrow in the father heart of God, for the children we've rejected, for the lives so deeply scarred? And each light that we've extinguished has brought darkness to our land: upon the nation, upon the nation have mercy, Lord!

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today your daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen

God grant to the living grace, to the departed rest, to the Church, the State and all people, unity, peace and concord, and to us and all God's servants, life everlasting. And the blessing of God Almighty, Father, Son and Holy Spirit be with you all and remain with you always. Amen
