

When Sandy and I were on holiday this summer we decided to climb Ben Rinnes, a prominent hill in Moray. It was a fine day, though breezy at the top and so we looked for a sheltered place to eat our sandwiches. Another walker had already found a good place and we joined him. We asked if he was also on holiday and he told us that he lived nearby in Pluscarden. You can imagine the laughter when he told us he was a monk and we told him that we were Church of Scotland ministers. Shortly after, another four of the brothers from the Abbey arrived. We introduced one another and struck up a friendly conversation. They were all on a special day out. Then one of the brothers said that they were just in time for divine office before their picnic. A discussion took place as to whether they would say or sing it. They decided to sing. One of the brothers took the service booklets out of his rucksack and they began. They very kindly held out the booklets so that we could follow. The service consisted of chanted psalms in Latin. What the brothers didn't know, but what many of you do know, is that Sandy and I both sing in the Edinburgh University Renaissance Singers which means that we have learnt to chant Latin psalms. Much to the brothers' surprise, the two Church of Scotland ministers ioined in. Once the service was finished Sandy and I headed back down the hill with an invitation to call in to Pluscarden anytime.

It was a special and moving moment of prayer offered together by Christians from different church traditions. It was made possible because of the generous and friendly welcome given to us by the brothers and because we were open to accepting their invitation. The Ben Rinnes hilltop experience was unique, however

It shows us what is possible when we are open to the prompting of the Holy Spirit. Friendship and hospitality, invitation and welcome in Christ's name are at the heart of our faith and when we follow Christ's example, in our church and our community then we will find blessing in unexpected places and surprising ways.

Moving towards union



with Haddington West Church

coordinating The group meetings continue to be positive and friendly. At our June meeting the Presbytery Clerk outlined what will happen when our minister Alison retires at the end of April next year. At that point an Interim Moderator will be appointed to St Mary's by Presbytery. A locum minister may also be employed. When John Vischer retires a different Interim Moderator will be appointed to Haddington West. The vote of the Kirk Sessions and Congregations can then be held and if agreed, the union can take place. This would be the end of summer 2025 at the earliest. Once the union takes place the process for calling a new minister can begin. In the meantime the coordinating group will work on the Draft Basis of Union.

On Wednesday, 18th September, 7 to 7.30pm, St Mary's Parish Church will once again be the candlelit venue for 'Quiet Time'.

This offers an opportunity to step out of the busy-ness of life for a few moments of quiet reflection. Why not try this different form of worship? We would love to see you there!

News from the Belfry in the 25th Anniversary Year of the new bells



June was a busy month for the ringers at St Mary's Haddington.

Tower Outing

We began on 1st June with our annual tower outing to Embleton in the north east of England where we enjoyed the ring of six. After a quick coffee stop in the sunshine at Embleton, we headed to Whitley Bay for a picnic. After lunch, we rang at St Paul's, Whitley Bay, and then onward to ring ten at North Shields and Gosforth. For some of our newer recruits this was the first time they had a ring on ten. Everyone had the opportunity

to ring rounds and call changes on ten and we enjoyed both sets of bells immensely.

Anniversary Ring

Just a few days later, on 6th June, we celebrated the 25th anniversary of the dedication of the new bells at Haddington with a successful ringing of a quarter of Plain Bob Minor.

Three of those ringing on 6th June had also rung in the 1999 dedication service by the Very Revd. Dr John Cairns.

This was the culmination of much fund-raising and hard work to install, at St Mary's, the redundant ring from Dunecht House, Aberdeenshire.

Annual Dinner

A couple of weeks later on 22nd June the Haddington Society of Change Ringers held its 25th annual dinner at Craigielaw Golf Club. During the day, we had successfully scored another quarter peal, with one of our newer recruits, who had learned to ring as part of the Haddington Ringing Course, successfully ringing his first quarter.

Dedication Remembered

The following day, during the morning service, the Minster highlighted the 25th anniversary of the dedication of the bells and spoke to current ringing Master Chris Thomas, and to myself about our experiences of being part of the ringing at Haddington. Then the Very Revd. Dr John Cairns, who is now retired and a member of the congregation at St Mary's, spoke very movingly about the dedication of the bells 25 years earlier. He highlighted how important the bells are as part of the life of St Mary's, and how much they mean to the congregation and the wider community in the town.

SACR coming to Haddington

There remains one more celebratory event in this our 25th Anniversary year, which is the Scottish Association of Change Ringers' autumn meeting in October. Time enough to gather our energies to welcome members of the SACR to Haddington!




Concerts & Events

St Mary's Walking Group have kindly invited CA supporters from Haddington Churches and beyond to join them on their monthly walk in September. Not all walkers need to be sponsored – just come along for the fellowship.

The 6 mile walk starts at St Mary's Church North Door at 9.30am (Gather at 9.00 - 9.20am for Registration) and finishes at The Trinity Centre about 12.30pm where we are invited for refreshments. Bring a packed lunch.

I think only seasoned walkers will do the full 6 mile route but there will be points where folks can drop out and return to town safely. These drop-out points make walks of 1 mile, 2.5miles and 4.7 miles. We will walk as a group and stewarding at crossing points etc will be done by the leaders.


