

ESTHER NESS, who passed away on 26th October 2024 aged 93

IN MEMORY OF ESTHER NESS JOHN VISCHER

Esther was born in 1931 at home in Stranraer, the youngest of six girls. Her mother hailed from Lochboisdale, South Uist, which instilled in Esther a lifelong love for that part of Scotland's western edge, its people and its way of life. Indeed, she was brought up to speak Gaelic. Up until her marriage to Alex Dewar in 1952 she lived and worked in Strangaer, and then moved east to Edinburgh. She became mother to their daughter Alexa in 1965 and their son David in 1967, a vocation at which, in their words, "she excelled". In various places of work her winsome personality would endear her to fellow employees and customers alike, gaining trust and friendship. After the death of Alex in 1992, Esther was married again in 1993 to Ian Ness, and together they moved to Haddington the following year. She loved living in Haddington, experiencing it as a welcoming and friendly town. Her faith in God led her to join the West Church and its fellowship, to seek support through worship and the regular coming together to hear the Word of God. In terms of what it means to belong to God's household we trust that she now sees as she believed.

From the eulogy: "Esther loved life, she embraced it all. Like everyone she faced challenges but she always fought back and carried on. She was small in stature, large in character and had a backbone of steel plus a gritty determination to make the very best of the life she was given."

She leaves behind her husband, Ian. We commend him and all the family to God's care and comfort and to your prayers.

SILIGURI / HARVEST THANKSGIVING

JOHN WEIERTER (ST MARY'S)

We came together for a joint Harvest Thanksgiving service with the West Church on Sunday 6th October. The service was well attended and hearty fellowship was enjoyed at the soup and pudding lunch afterwards.

As part of the service we learned about a twinning arrangement the West Church has with a group of churches in West Bengal, India, called the Siliguri Pastorate. Jacqueline Waugh spoke warmly of her experience with the twinning and of a visit to Scotland made by a couple of their Pastors, just before the pandemic. She described the culture shock the pastors felt when they first arrived and how amazed they were by the technology in the schools that they visited.

Jacqueline also related greetings and reports that have come recently from their contact, Marolina, about their church year in their churches. Some of her stories about the difficulties faced by the pastors when visiting outlying churches were quite harrowing. They might need to cross rivers by laying down bamboo poles as a bridge and they are sometimes attacked by members of hostile factions. However, the impression is that their churches are doing well and are in good heart. We were asked to keep them in our prayers.

SOME BACKGROUND ON SILIGURI PASTORATE



GEOGRAPHICAL

Siliguri is a city of over I million people in north east India, commanding the route through a narrow neck of land between the border of Bangladesh and Bhutan, which links India with its eastern states of West Bengal, Assam etc. The city is not industrial, rather more business and commercial.

CHURCH ORGANISATION

The Church of North India (CNI) Pastorate of Siliguri consists of one medium sized church on a limited site in the centre of the city and six daughter churches in outlying areas of the city. They a total of about 700 or so communicants.

UNION OF THE WEST CHURCH WITH ST MARY'S

For up-to-date information regarding the forthcoming union, I print below the statement as it appears in St Mary's newsletter:



At their separate meetings on 5th November, the Kirk Sessions of St Mary's and the West Church voted in favour of the Basis of Union which had been prepared by the Working Group which is made up of elders from both Kirk Sessions. The Basis of Union now goes through a process of being checked by Presbytery Planning committee, the Church of Scotland legal team, and the Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group. Once they are happy that everything is as it should be, the Basis of Union will be voted on by both congregations.



"THE SON OF GOD" JEFFREY ARCHER

'He was born in a barn, his father a carpenter, and his mother a decent woman, but they were of no significance, and certainly couldn't have afforded to give the boy a private education. And yet, as a teenager, he was arguing the toss with his elders and betters in the council chambers.

He never got a proper job, just roamed around the countryside, unshaven, and living off bread and water and the occasional fish, while offering his opinions to those who cared to listen.

He became the manager of a football team known as The Disciples, not one of them a star, in fact the twelfth man rather let the side down by accepting a transfer fee of thirty pieces of silver to play for the opposition.

The authorities eventually arrested him as a rabble-rouser, but couldn't



decide what to charge him with, other than the fact he claimed he was the Son of God.

They strung him up with a couple of criminals, and when he finally gave up the ghost, rather assumed that would be the last they'd hear of him. The Disciples were relegated at the end of the season, in fact the captain denied on more than one occasion that he'd ever been a member of His team.

When He died at the age of thirty-three, there were no obituaries in the local press reporting his achievements, no glossy supplements highlighting his colourful career, no radio programmes to discuss his legacy, and no box sets recording any of his miracles.


