Letter from the Manse

John 16.33 – Jesus: "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."

Dear friends, one of the implications of the resurrection of Jesus Christ – that he rose from the dead on the third day after his crucifixion, that he was seen by multiple witnesses and that he ascended in to heaven in view of his disciples 40 days later – is that it makes the question 'What shall we make of his word?' most relevant. Because bound up with his word is now the fact of his presence. Indeed, this word is a means by which his presence is mediated to us.

"Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my word shall never pass away" (Luke 21.33) is not spoken of some disembodied piece of information, but of a living voice – the voice not of one that was, but one who is. Keeping this in mind, let us hear what he says.

"In the world you will have trouble." This is true. And Jesus acknowledges it. It is not the case that faith in God and in Jesus Christ make a person immune against the troubling aspects of life, or give them leave to expect that they will be shielded against worry, fear and loss.

Going, as we have been and still are, through this period of the pandemic, our sense of trouble has surely been deepened. Much that we were accustomed to doing and having has become a source of risk and danger. Fear has crept in, leaving many a shared space vacant; communities so reduced it forces people into isolation, safety to be sought at the cost of mental well-being and social interaction, as well as, of course, many a business and livelihood. Troubles of various kinds are by the pandemic only made more troublesome. an anxious heart.

Yes, in the world we will have trouble. Fear, worry, anxiety - they will come calling. But the point is for the disciples: Look, even as it

And there is the experience that things we have believed and hoped in have been found wanting, have crumbled away under the weight of trouble, leaving in their wake an anxious heart. Yes, in the world we will have trouble. Fear, worry, anxiety - they will come calling. But the point is for the disciples: Look, even as it is so - JESUS KNOWS. [The answer to their question 'Does God know?' is 'Yes', meaning not that He is merely aware of it but that He is up to something good. "Nobody knows the trouble I've seen, nobody knows – but Jesus"]

"But take heart!" To Jesus the world's trouble is not unknown; what is known by you is known by him; by him the world's trouble is known in all its fearful depth and truth, even through suffering unto death. Knowing it, he has made it his own, has stamped his own loving authority on it; and the words "But take heart!" are spoken by the One who is with the troubled, in their trouble, so they may know the One that they are with (and that trust in God may get its proper due).

"I have overcome the world." Jesus gives the reason why we can take heart in our troubles when we are with him. He faced the world and did so in love, not standing above it or outside it, not judging and condemning it, but suffering the cause of its troubles – sin, death and hell. And in suffering he conquered, on this God put his seal by raising him from the dead. In the risen One there is the remaking of the world through suffering love, through him comes its healing. When Jesus tells us to take heart, he does so because he knows that in him and through him, that is, by faith in him, we too overcome the world, and shall do so.

Jesus said, "Because I live, you too will live." – John14.19

"Do not be afraid. I am the First and the Last. I am the living One; I was dead, and now look, I am alive for ever and ever! And I hold the keys of death and Hades." – Revelation 1.17-18

An excerpt from "A Deep Dependence" by Bill Crowder:

The Wonder of the Cross (Hebrews 12 vv1-4)

While visiting Australia, I had the opportunity on a particularly clear night to see the Southern Cross. Located in the southern hemisphere, this constellation is one of the most distinctive. Mariners and navigators began relying on it as early as the fifteenth century for direction and navigation through the seas. Although relatively small, it is visible throughout most of the year. The Southern Cross was so vivid that night that even I could pick it out of the bundle of stars. It was truly a magnificent sight!

The scriptures tell us of an even more magnificent cross, the Cross of Christ. When we look at the stars we see the handiwork of the creator. However when we look at the Cross, we see the creator dying for his creation. Hebrews 12 v 2 calls us to 'fix our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the Cross, scorning its shame and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.'

Here is the wonder of Calvary's Cross: while we were still in our sins, our saviour died for us (Romans 5 v8). Those who place their trust in Christ are reconciled to God, and He navigates them though life. (2 Corinthians 8-10)

Christ's sacrifice on the Cross is the greatest of all wonders.

WHAT DOES THE RESURRECTION MEAN TO ME?

'For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life' (John 3:16). I believe that Jesus died for my sins on Calvary's cross and whoever believes in Him will be saved. I believe that God raised Him from the dead on the third day. Jesus conquered death! 'Death has been swallowed up in victory. 'Where, O death is your victory? Where O death is your sting?' (1 Corinthians 15: 54-55). Jesus Himself said 'I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in Me will live even though they die and whoever lives by believing in Me will never die' (John 11: 25-26).

We are spirit, soul and body - our bodies will die but our spirit and soul will live for eternity. 1 Corinthians 15 is a wonderful chapter - the resurrection of Christ and the resurrection of all who die believing in him. Verse 19 says 'If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied'. Verse 22 states 'For as in Adam, all die, so in Christ, all will be made alive'.

I find it interesting to read in Mark 3: 20-21 that Jesus' family went to take charge of Him, for they said 'He is out of his mind'. Yet, after the resurrection, James, the half-brother of Jesus, not the disciple James, became leader of the church in Jerusalem and wrote the book in the Bible that bears his name. He opens his Epistle with the words 'James, a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ'. What an about turn! I really like the book of James. It is only five chapters long, but is full of practical advice e.g. 'Do not merely listen to the word and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says' (James 1: 22)

It is really very sad news that before Christmas, minister in Switzerland Mr. John has lost his Sister in Law. We are very sorry for his all family members.

We consider it is a great privilege for us that for our Siliguri Pastorate you all the chosen people of God interested to know about us. Not only that, we believe you always remember us in your prayers. As result we all are fine and doing well.

From Sunday November 1st, we have started our church service in our church. Before that we were doing our Sunday service by Zoom and Facebook. But we are maintaining the Government protocol of covid19. So we have requested all senior citizens and children not to attend the church service physically. So these days they (Senior citizens and children) are attending church service through online. But others are coming to church. By the grace of God these days, in our city day by day is going to normal condition. From 12th February, Government has given permission to open the schools, but only for students of nine to twelve standards. Surrounding Siliguri city, we have six sister churches. Five churches are in the tea garden area and one in village area. It was a very hard time for them. We are regularly praying for our Pastor Rev. Abilak Thakur. both kidneys are not working as they should. In the last four years, he has been doing dialysis thrice a week. A few believers came and we celebrated Christmas. These days we are planning and praying to conduct a few programs for Sunday school student youths if the situation is good.



World Day of Prayer 2021

In 1910, more than four hundred women met for the World Mission Conference in Edinburgh, bringing their experience and wisdom developed through years of ecumenical partnership in many countries; World Day of Prayer was born

WDP is an international ecumenical prayer movement in more than 180 countries and over 1000 languages. Every year Christians of many traditions and all ages celebrate a common, global day of prayer on the first Friday in March. Worship services and prayer events are held all around the world on this day. Each year women from a different country plan the World Day of Prayer service. This year's was planned by the women of the Republic of Vanuatu (population approx. 300,000).

Every year the offerings from the service go to support various Christian causes, some in the planning country which this year would have been Christian societies which have projects in Vanuatu. The theme for the 2021 service was "Build on a Strong Foundation" which reflects Vanuatu's long road to recovery following the devastation caused by cyclone Harold in April 2020. On two islands most homes were damaged or destroyed, and 12,000 people had to live in makeshift conditions as well as coping with COVID 19. Our thoughts and prayers are with them.

Four churches in Haddington take year about to host the service. This year, due to the current regulations, St Mary's RC church was sadly unable to do so. Hopefully next March will see us able to hold our World Day of Prayer service, hosted in 2022 by Haddington West Church.

To allow the work of Christian Aid to continue unhindered among the poorest and most disadvantaged children and adults on the planet, the importance of the effort we make this year cannot be overstated. Treasurer's Update

To start this newsletter, I thought you might like a little more information regarding the church accounts that I administer on your behalf.

Most individuals have one bank account and one cheque book. However, the church has actually seven separate accounts each with their respective cheque books and pay-in books. Six of these accounts are called restricted accounts, that is, the money in the account can only be spent on a particular item. The main account is the General Fund Treasurers Account, this is the main working account for the day to day business of the church.

Unfortunately, we are in exactly the same situation as last year at this time. When the church is closed, we turn all the heating to frost settings. However there is still a cost to keep the building ready to re-open when the situation allows. In addition, open or closed we still have to pay each month significant insurance costs and Ministry & Mission costs. In financial terms open or closed we are still losing about £2500.00 per month and having to use our reserves to cover (which are not as healthy following last year's losses).

My main focus now will be trying to increase by all means possible the church's reserve fund to meet the challenges that lay ahead.








Morham Castle.

rwas excited to be accepted as a volunteer at a dig in the field that looks down onto the church, opposite the first house on the left heading down to the church, August 2019. The archaeologists had been asked to look for any evidence of Morham Castle that had been marked on ancient maps. We had a week to dig trenches and see what we could find. There were 3 or 4 trenches cut into the field with a digger and we started the hand work, eventually in the biggest trench we found large stones, some with mortar on them and so we kept digging and found what was down believed to be the corner of the foundations of the castle. There was a buzz of excitement as it became clearer that this was indeed the castle. In another trench found an almost we complete, but broken, medieval cooking vessel. It was made of a reddish clay and was still black with soot on the outside.

.It was exciting to think that the last person to touch it would have been a medieval cook who threw it away in disgust (it was a distance from the castle) because maybe it had cracked and the dinner was lost. It was a very enjoyable week, even though the weather was changeable, and I learned so much about how archaeologists record their finds. There was meant to be a follow up dig in May 2020 but unfortunately the pandemic has put that on hold.

The rubbing of the Morham Cross was made by Irene Anderson, I don't know when this would have done as the cross, or what remains of it, is now in the National Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh.

The cross is a rare piece of early Christian history and lay undiscovered and protected from the elements for many years, so is an important piece. So we have the rubbing to remind ourselves of it. I went to the NMS a couple of years ago to see it and it is amazing. The big window behind the communion table is not a copy but a reminder that we had such a beautiful item at our church, and was kindly donated to our church by Prof. & Mrs Smith, members of our congregation, in memory of their 19 year old son who was killed in a tragic accident at Hadrian's wall.


